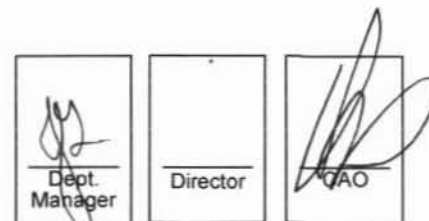



The Corporation of the District of North Vancouver
Bylaw 7921

A bylaw to amend the Bee Keeping Bylaw 6474, 1992

The Council for The Corporation of the District of North Vancouver enacts as follows:

1. Citation

This bylaw may be cited as "Bee Keeping Bylaw 6474, 1992, Amendment Bylaw 7921, 2012 (Amendment 1)".

2. Amendments

The Bee Keeping Bylaw 6474 is amended as follows:

2.1 by deleting section 2 and replacing it with the following:

Every person keeping bees and the owner of any parcel of land on which bees are kept must:

- (a) provide adequate water to prevent the bees from seeking water from other sources, such as neighbourhood swimming pools, birdbaths, ponds or other bodies of water;
- (b) take all reasonable measures to prevent swarming and aggressive behaviour by the bees; and
- (c) if the bees swarm or show signs of aggressive behaviour, ensure that the bees are requeened.

2.2 by amending section 3(a) by deleting the number "4" and substituting the number "2";

2.3 by deleting section 3(c).

SUBJECT: PROPOSED LONGBOARDING STRATEGY

RECOMMENDATION: THAT "Street and Traffic Bylaw 7125, 2004, Amendment Bylaw 7915, 2011 (Amendment 9)" and "Bylaw Notice Enforcement Bylaw 7458, 2004, Amendment Bylaw 7916, 2011 (Amendment 21)" are given FIRST, SECOND, and THIRD readings.

REASON FOR REPORT: To clarify the District's regulations with respect to longboarding.

SUMMARY: Concerns have been expressed that some longboarding activity, such as travelling at high speeds while carving across vehicle lanes presents an unacceptable risk. The District wishes to strengthen the bylaw to provide clear direction that these higher risk activities are not permitted on District roads.

BACKGROUND: There is a concern that high speed riding and carving on a roadway creates a safety risk as:

- Drivers may not expect nor see longboarders in the roadway;
- Riders often travel at a relatively high speed; and
- Despite the use of a helmet or other protective gear, a collision with a vehicle or fixed object could result in a serious injury.

A Council Workshop was held on January 30, 2012 for Council to hear from the public concerning proposed bylaw changes, as well as other strategies that may be undertaken to improve longboard rider safety such as:

- permitting sanctioned events on closed roads through a permit process; and/or
- supporting education.

EXISTING POLICY:

The District's Street and Traffic Bylaw applies to longboarding, as the Motor Vehicle Act delegates authority to regulate skateboards to municipalities. Longboards fall under the existing skateboard definition, but the bylaw was not specifically developed with longboarding in mind. Fines are listed in the Bylaw for practices such as riding on the sidewalk, not wearing a helmet, or riding at night. Fines are \$45 for most offences, but \$90 for interfering with or obstructing traffic.

ANALYSIS:***Preferred Approach***

Changes to the Street and Traffic Bylaw offer the most direct way to clarify which behaviours are appropriate on District roads. Proposed changes are listed below and a marked up copy of the existing bylaw is attached as ATTACHMENT 1:

- Add 'longboarding' to the definition of 'skateboard' to make it clear that the skateboarding restrictions apply to longboards;
- Add a new section to make it an offence to ride a skateboard, longboard, etc. (a) without due care and attention or (b) without reasonable consideration for others on the road. This would give police and bylaw enforcement officers additional enforcement tools for dealing with unsafe longboarding activity;
- Add a section regarding the impoundment of skateboards providing that they can be impounded for 24 hours if used in contravention of the bylaw and that if the boarder is 16 years or under, they must bring a parent or legal guardian to collect the board; and
- The proposed bylaw includes a fine structure for subsequent penalties. First offence fines remain the same at \$45, while second and subsequent offences are \$100.

Alternatives

During consultation, suggestions were made by the public to:

- Allow riding at night provided lights and/or reflective clothing were worn;
- Provide for graduated fines, such that a first offense would attract a lower fine; and/or
- Coordinate regulations with the City of North Vancouver.

Staff are not recommending a change to allow riding after dark at this time as it would introduce another level of risk. Should the District's strategy be successful in discouraging unsafe riding practices that are currently occurring, this change could be considered in the future.

Finally, there are several regulation differences between the District and the City of North Vancouver. For example the District of North Vancouver does not permit riding on sidewalks, while the City of North Vancouver does permit this with specific exceptions. District staff will confer with City of North Vancouver, but at this time such a change is considered outside the scope of this review.

Concurrence: District transportation, bylaw, legal and planning staff have worked closely with the RCMP to develop the proposed change.

Financial Impacts: No District expenditures are expected at this time.

Liability/Risk: As longboarding is a relatively new activity, data is not yet available to assess the risk quantitatively. However, one fatal longboarding crash has occurred within the District on Mount Seymour Road at Anne MacDonald Way.

Social Policy Implications: The use of longboards as a method of transportation can be supported for its health benefits and as an alternative to motorized travel.

Public Input: Public input was collected from:

- i. The community meeting held on July 18, 2011;
- ii. Results of a survey posted on the District's web site;
- iii. A staff meeting with Longboarding Coalition representatives on January 4, 2012; and
- iv. A Council Workshop on January 30, 2012.

The Report to Council for the January 30, 2012 Workshop and the minutes from that Workshop provide a summary of the results of the consultation.

Conclusion: In revising the bylaw as proposed, the District is pursuing a balanced approach to address the risk issues associated with higher risk longboard riding, while acknowledging the transportation and activity benefits this activity may provide.

OPTIONS:

1. Council may choose to provide three readings to the Bylaws (recommended option); OR
2. Council may choose not to provide three readings to the Bylaws and direct staff to take other action.

PROPOSED CHANGES to STREET AND TRAFFIC BYLAW 7125

Part 3 - Interpretation

302. In this bylaw:

Skateboard means all wheeled objects, coasters, toys, conveyances, or similar devices used for transportation or sport which are propelled by human power, **including longboards, but not including** and ~~does not include~~ bicycles or roller skates.

Roller Skating and Skateboarding

617 No person shall propel, coast, ride or in any other way use Roller Skates or a Skateboard:

617.1 on a sidewalk;

617.2 on any Roadway or Lane unless that person is properly wearing a helmet on his or her head, except if that person is a person for whom the wearing of a helmet would interfere with an essential religious practice;

617.3 on any Roadway or Lane except as near to the right side of the Roadway or Lane as is practicable;

617.4 on any Roadway or Lane that is posted with a speed limit exceeding 50 kilometres per hour;

617.5 on a Roadway or Lane between sunset and sunrise;

617.6 on any Roadway or Lane while being towed by a vehicle, bicycle or animal;

617.7 on any Roadway or Lane in such a manner as to pose a hazard to traffic; and

617.8 on any Roadway or Lane in any position other than standing; **or**

617.9 on any Roadway or Lane:

(a) without due care and attention; or

(b) without reasonable consideration for other persons or vehicles using the Roadway or Lane.

Part 12 - Impoundment of Vehicles or Chattels

1201. Any chattel, obstruction or vehicle which is standing or parked contrary to any provision of this bylaw or which is otherwise unlawfully occupying a portion of a Highway or public place may be removed, detained and impounded by an Enforcement Officer or the Manager of Purchasing, or by a person acting in accordance with the directions of the District.
1202. ***With the exception of skateboards which are specifically dealt with in section 1210, Any*** chattel, obstruction, or vehicle removed, detained or impounded under this bylaw may be recovered by the Owner between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, except holidays, by paying the fees, costs and expenses levied in accordance with this Part to the District's towing contractor or authorized agent at the time of impoundment at its place of business, or to the District, as the case may be.
1203. If a motor vehicle is removed, detained or impounded and not claimed by its Owner within 48 hours, written notice shall be given by registered mail to the registered Owner at his or her address as shown on the records of the Registrar of Motor Vehicles, advising the Owner of the seizure and impoundment, the sum payable to release the motor vehicle and the date of advertising for sale by public auction if unclaimed.
1204. The Owner of a chattel or obstruction removed, detained or impounded pursuant to this Part shall pay those fees, costs and expenses set out in Schedule "O" of the District of North Vancouver Fees and Charges Bylaw 6481.
1205. The Owner of a vehicle removed, detained or impounded pursuant to this Part shall pay those fees, costs and expenses set by the Municipal Engineer from time to time by order, pursuant to section 403.4.
1206. If a chattel, obstruction or vehicle is removed, detained or impounded, and not claimed by its Owner within 1 month from date of seizure, the chattel, obstruction or vehicle may be sold at public auction at the direction of the Manager of Purchasing.
1207. Notwithstanding any other provision of this bylaw, where in the opinion of the Manager of Purchasing a chattel, obstruction or vehicle removed, detained, or impounded is a perishable article, has an apparent market value of less than \$2,000.00 or if its custody involves unreasonable expense or inconvenience, the Manager of Purchasing may decide not to proceed to public auction, and may dispose of the chattel, obstruction or vehicle in any manner in which he or she deems expedient.
1208. Before selling a chattel, obstruction or vehicle at public auction under this Part, the District shall advertise the time and place of the proposed public auction in a newspaper circulating in the District, giving at least 7 days' notice of such proposed sale, and shall, in cases where a vehicle is intended to be sold and such vehicle is registered with the Registrar of Motor Vehicles, send written notice to the registered Owner of the vehicle at the address shown on the records of the Registrar of Motor Vehicles, advising of the seizure, the sum payable to release the vehicle, and the date of proposed sale by public auction, if unclaimed.

1209. The proceeds of sale by public auction shall be applied first to the cost of the sale, second to the fees, cost and expenses of the District or its towing contractor, and the balance shall be held for the Owner. If the balance remains unclaimed at the end of 1 year from the date of sale, such balance shall be paid into the general revenue of the District.
1210. No person shall prevent or attempt to prevent or interfere with the removal, detaining or impounding of any chattel, obstruction or vehicle by the District under this Part.

Impoundment of Skateboards

1210. In addition to any other penalty or method of enforcement prescribed by this bylaw, an Enforcement Officer may detain and impound any Skateboard being used by any person in contravention of this bylaw, for a period of 24 hours and such Skateboard may be recovered at the North Vancouver RCMP detachment office located at 147 East 14th Street, North Vancouver between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. Where the owner of an impounded Skateboard is 16 years old or under, he or she must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian at the time of collecting the Skateboard.

4240. **1211.** No person shall prevent or attempt to prevent or interfere with the removal, detaining or impounding of any chattel, obstruction or vehicle by the District under this Part.

2. Amendments

- 2.1 Section 302 of the Street and Traffic Bylaw 7125 is amended by deleting the definition of "Skateboard" and inserting the following:

Skateboard means all wheeled objects, coasters, toys, conveyances, or similar devices used for transportation or sport which are propelled by human power, including longboards, but not including bicycles or roller skates;

- 2.2 Bylaw 7125 is amended by

- (a) deleting the word "and" at the end of section 617.7;
- (b) adding the word "or" at the end of section 617.8; and
- (c) adding the following as section 617.9:

617.9 on any Roadway or Lane:

- (c) without due care and attention; or
- (d) without reasonable consideration for other persons or vehicles using the Roadway or Lane.

- 2.3 Bylaw 7125 is amended by adding the heading "**Impoundment of Vehicles or Chattels**" before section 1201.

- 2.4 Bylaw 7125 is amended by adding the following at the beginning of section 1202:

With the exception of skateboards which are specifically dealt with in section 1210,

- 2.5 Bylaw 7125 is amended by adding the following as section 1210 and re-numbering the remaining section accordingly:

Impoundment of Skateboards

1210. In addition to any other penalty or method of enforcement prescribed by this bylaw, an Enforcement Officer may detain and impound any Skateboard being used by any person in contravention of this bylaw, for a period of 24 hours and such Skateboard may be recovered at the North Vancouver RCMP detachment office located at 147 East 14th Street, North Vancouver between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. Where the owner of an impounded Skateboard is 16 years old or under, he or she must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian at the time of collecting the Skateboard.
